Notes from the Pastor

During the weeks following Pentecost we explore what it means to have God's Spirit among and within us. When we begin to explore our relationship with God, we must first remember who we are. Our core, our deepest DNA, is divine; it is the Spirit of Love implanted within us by our Creator at the first moment of our creation.

Those who have gone to their depths uncover an indwelling Presence. It is a deep and loving "yes" inherent within us. Christian theology names this inner Presence as the Holy Spirit, which is precisely God as immanent, within, and even our deepest and truest self. As Paul tells us in the 8th chapter of Romans, "If we don't know how or what to pray, it doesn't matter. He does our praying in and for us, making prayer out of our wordless sighs, our aching groans. He knows us far better than we

know ourselves, knows our pregnant condition, and keeps us present before God. That's why we can be so sure that every detail in our lives of love for God is worked into something good." MSG.

The principal characteristic of human beings is our role as bearers of consciousness, of intelligence—in a word, of the spirit. The spirit infuses the whole universe from its very beginning, but in human beings it becomes self-aware and free.

Nothing shows the presence of the spirit in human life as well as love does. When love is expressed as compassion, the spirit enables us to come out of ourselves, put ourselves in the other's place, bend over the person fallen by the wayside. In forgiveness we transcend ourselves, so that the past does not have the last word and cannot close off the present and the future.

The highest expression of the spirit is the one that opens

us to the Great Other, in love and trust. It establishes a dialogue with God, listens from the conscience to God's call, and delivers us trustingly into the palm of God's hand.

Some saints and mystics have described this Presence as "closer to me than I am to myself" or "more me than I am myself." Yet this True Self still must be awakened and chosen. The Holy Spirit is given equally to all; but it must be received, too. We must activate it within ourselves. People who totally receive this Presence and draw life from it are the ones we traditionally call saints.

The Holy Spirit is never created by our actions or behavior; it is naturally indwelling, our inner being with God. Culture and even religion often teach us to live out of our false self of reputation, self -image, role, possessions, money, appearance, and so on. Only as this fails us, and it always eventually does, will the Holy Spirit within us stand revealed and ready to guide us.

From this more spacious and grounded place, one naturally connects, empathizes, forgives, and loves just about everything. We were made in love, for love, and unto love.

This deep inner "yes" is God in us, already loving God through us.

This group decided that a bed is a basic need for the proper physical, emotional and mental support that a child needs. All children deserve a safe, comfortable place to lay their heads.

With that idea in mind Sleep In Heavenly Peace was born to deliver top notch beds and bunk beds to children and families in need.

As this idea spread others realized that many communities had children that did not have a bed to sleep in. Sleep In Heavenly Peace has grown to become a National Organization. There are chapters in many states including Wisconsin. Oshkosh is the home to one of the chapters in Wisconsin.

How would I be able to help?

Sleep In Heavenly Peace is made up of many volunteers who give of their time and talents. Builds are held as often as need, to assemble and deliver beds. During a building session peoples skills vary from pounding nails to cutting boards and assembling beds. Most builds are held on

Saturday mornings so that people who work during the week are able to participate.

The Oshkosh Chapters of Sleep In Heavenly Peace also provides all of the bedding needed for the assembled bed. This includes, mattresses, mattress pads, top and bottom sheets, pillow and pillow case and a comforter. All of these items are provided as new and unopened. The cost of these items adds up quickly so cash donations are always appreciated.



Unsung Heroes of Methodism: Thomas Webb

You might think Captain Thomas Webb was a pirate as he wore a patch over one eye.

Captain Webb was a preacher, one of the first Methodist preachers in America. Captain

Thomas Webb appeared on the pages of Methodist history out of nowhere. We know very little about his early life. He was born in England in the 1720s, served in the British army, and lost his eye in the Seven Years' War.

Webb was converted to Methodism in 1765, a very charismatic individual. His appearance gave him a commanding presence. He often preached in his uniform placing his sword on the altar for dramatic effect. However, Webb's powerful preaching is what kept listeners' attention. Wesley was impressed by Webb and allowed him to become an itinerant preacher in England.


Still serving as an officer in the British Army, he was sent to New York in 1767.

Methodism had been brought to North America some years before by Irish immigrants settling in Maryland and New York. Wesley granted him permission to preach freely across the American Colonies. When not on duty, Webb spent every free moment traveling and preaching the Gospel. He would travel among the societies freely, assisting their leaders and helping create a sense of unity among them. Webb is credited with spreading Methodism to Delaware.

New York was already home to one of the most successful Methodist societies in the American Colonies, founded by <u>Barbara Heck</u> and Philip Embury. Webb helped the society fund the building of its first official meeting house that would later become <u>John Street UMC</u> and preaching there regularly.

Webb could see the American societies needed more central organization and joined others in petitioning Wesley to send more preachers to North America. Wesley responded by sending a series of new overseers from Britain to administer the societies, including future bishop Francis Asbury. Webb continued to itinerate in America until the Revolution. Still serving in the British Army, he was arrested by the new patriot government and spent time as a prisoner of war. After being released he left America for good and lived the rest of his days quietly in Bristol. He left behind a great legacy. His preaching had brought on many new conversions and his attempts to bring the scattered societies in the American Colonies together paved the way for future leaders like Francis Asbury.
